## FROM THE DEAN

**Greetings, CAS community!** 

I hope this issue of CAS Connections finds you making the best of the fall. And, to our students, I hope you are learning, growing, and progressing felicitously through the term. If you find yourself struggling, in need of guidance or if you just want to talk, you can always stop by the CAS office (BBH 158) for a snack and a conversation.

Growing up, I always associated the fall with baseball, with the culmination of the Major League season in the World Series. Now I also associate fall with basketball as we find ourselves in the midst of the WNBA playoffs and finals (at least as I write). The WNBA and its success are about so much more than basketball. The league, or at least its players by their very composition, has long represented a challenge to racism, misogyny, and heterosexism. The league's success, I like to think, registers an element of our culture's strength in eroding these anti-democratic forces of prejudice, discrimination, and outright dehumanization. The WNBA players, in fact, have a proud history of protecting American democracy, especially during the 2020 elections—just check out the documentary *Power of the Dream* to learn this story.

As we approach an intensely consequential election and have the opportunity to exercise our civic privilege of voting, it seems worth reflecting on the role and value of the liberal arts and sciences in U.S. culture and society. Recently in the College of Arts and Sciences, we've done a lot of talking about our Career Readiness Initiative, which focuses on the core competencies students cultivate in our classes across the Arts and Sciences curriculum. These core competencies prepare our students to do the meaningful and necessary work of the world, which employers say they value and seek in job candidates.

While we have put an emphasis on *career* readiness in order to highlight that particular value for students who might not understand how some of our disciplines equip them to do rewarding work in the world, we also know that our curriculum prepares students to be active, engaged, and able participants in the social and political life of the nation.

In the context of an election, for example, if you want to evaluate a candidate's positions on global warming and climate change, it would help to have some scientific knowledge and understanding; likewise, if you want to understand and assess a candidate's approach to inflation, it would help to understand the causes of inflation and have some understanding of the dynamics of our economy; and so on. Most generally, in this age of severe disinformation and just outright dishonesty in the national political conversation, it helps to possess sharply honed skills of critical thinking, such as those we cultivate in the Arts and Sciences.

Public higher education needs to be understood and supported as a public good precisely because it helps prepare us to be participants in the contest for democracy. The work of democracy is indeed the meaningful work of the world too.

So, I wish you all a happy fall of baseball, basketball, democracy, and whatever else helps you get your groove on!

#### What are your career goals?


I really value the mental muscles I build from doing academic work, so I plan on attending graduate school. Eventually, though, I think I'd like to work in government at the federal level.

#### What do you like about NEIU so far?

I do like the space—physical and social—that NEIU provides. Our main campus is a secluded, walkable size, and it has trees and grass and things that make going to class or wandering around enjoyable. I like seeing my peers and professors out and about, too, and all the fliers showing off activities that NEIU people are putting together. The web of health and career-related student support services is also great, and I've witnessed very caring faculty here at CAS. They'll make the effort to check up on you or to recall their interactions with you, which is nice.

#### Anything interesting we should know about you?

I was able to do a semester in Prague through NEIU's Office of International Programs. Actually, that photo of me is from a day trip I took to Karlovy Vary while I was there, in the Czech Republic. When I visited, they were setting up for the annual Karlovy Vary International Film Festival, which I didn't know was a thing at the time. The city also has a bunch of thermal springs with fountains you can drink from. The water tastes very metallic-y.



#### What is your educational history?

I got my Ph.D. from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. My thesis was in plant chemical ecology with research in the rainforests of Panama.

#### What are your research interests?

My research focus at NEIU has been on prairie ecology focusing on the impacts of fire on the prairie ecosystem.

#### What do you do at NEIU and beyond?

I am a Senior Instructor in Biology. My teaching focus is ecology and plant biology. In addition to General Ecology, I also teach Local Flora and Economic Botany with the goal of getting students to better appreciate our local habitats and the world of plants.

I am involved in the maintenance of the campus natural landscaping, including running the prescribed fires of the prairie and swamp white oak savannah. I am also a member of the Tree Campus USA committee and the management team for the Gensberg-Markham Prairie. I work with the University Professionals of Illinois and the Illinois Federation of Teachers to increase the investment in and support of public higher education in the state.

#### What are your hobbies?


My hobbies include running, gardening, brewing beer and mead, hiking, and camping.

Since then I have learned to review literature with a keener eye, drafted research goals, conducted a study, learned to collect, transcribe and manage data, co-designed a research study, found belonging with fellow researchers, formed my first research question, received coaching from Dr. Young and the SCSE team, wrote a research abstract, applied for my first conference, attended workshops on science communication, was awarded my first travel scholarship, received an invitation to present at SACNAS NDiSTEM 2024, learned to design a psychology poster, presented at a symposium, noodled on my research question for weeks and months after my internship ended just for fun, and soon I'll travel to Phoenix to present at my first conference.

After all the SCSE team and summer research program taught me, I finally do see what they saw in me on that first day. I am finally a researcher. And for that I am eternally grateful, and looking forward to the day I can pay this transformative experience forward."

In September, Associate Deans Amanda Dykema-Engblade and Ken Voglesonger visited NEIU's Gensburg-Markham Prairie with President Katrina Bell-Jordan. Naturalist Martha Lopez-Salazar and ecology professor Dr. Steve Frankel taught them lots about the prairie's plants and wildlife. Thanks again to the biology department for such a fun, educational afternoon!

Gensburg-Markham Prairie, managed by Northeastern Illinois University and the Nature Conservancy, is a 110-acre remnant of the tall-grass prairie that once covered the state of Illinois. This outdoor education laboratory provides student internship and research opportunities. Saved from development by NEIU in the 1970s, the prairie is now a dedicated Illinois Nature Preserve and National Natural Landmark. It includes large portions that have never been plowed, making it one of the highest-quality prairie sites in the Midwest, supporting rare plant and animal communities that aren't found in more highly disturbed prairie restorations.

On September 25, Northeastern's Department of Art + Design held its first ever Art + Design Fall Fest!There were close to 200 attendees, which included current NEIU students, faculty, staff, deans, prospective students, and community members. The fest included a projection mapping showcase on the side of Bernard Brommel Hall; an Art + Design open house for prospective students, including tours of the Art + Design Department's studio facilities; interactive art activities across Art + Design's studio spaces; a juried exhibition featuring creative works from community colleges across Illinois; and an art party for current Northeastern Art + Design majors and minors.

The goal of the event was for people, whether they're art and design majors or not, to get to know the department and think about art and design in new ways. It was also an opportunity to show off Northeastern's state-of-the-art facilities, including new student exhibition spaces, a Mac lab, a ceramics studio with multiple kilns and a raku firing area, a photography studio equipped for both analog and digital processes, a fully equipped printmaking studio, a letterpress studio, and a sculpture studio with dedicated areas for clay modeling as well as metal and wood shops. Additionally, NEIU has a Fab Lab which features cutting-edge 3D printers, a large-format CNC router, multiple laser and vinyl cutters, and a large-format laser cutter.

# Chicago Marathon












