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STUDENT HIGHLIGHT

Kevin Kelly | Chemistry



What are your career goals?

My immediate career goal is to work as an analytical chemist for the Stepan Company at their R&D facility in Northfield, IL. They don't know this yet. My overall career goal is to work as an analytical chemist, and to be good at it. Some analytical chem jobs are rewarding and engaging; others can be mind-numbingly repetitive. I figure the better I am at the work, the greater my chances of eventually landing one of the former.

Analytical chemistry is by nature somewhat tedious and exacting, so you'll never escape that. But I do like to solve physical problems, fix things, restore old tools, figure out cheaper ways to do things better, etc. I'm happiest when I'm MacGyvering. A job that incorporates some degree of that would be ideal.

What do you like about NEIU so far?

Being an adult "2nd degree" student (with two young boys at home), the flexibility of the chemistry program at NEIU, and the helpful approach of the faculty are what make this feasible for me. A lot of chem programs have a set, rigid progression of classes, designed for traditional full-time college students. While I see the merits of that, it would be overwhelming in my situation.

The professors I've had at NEIU also strike a good balance between rigor and lenience. The physical sciences are not "Easy A" classes. If you get too accommodating, you're effectively no longer teaching Orgo or Physics. On the other hand, if your class is nothing more than a Gaussian weed-wacker, or the swimsuit-competition of an intelligence pageant, I would argue that the same holds true. The professors here put a lot of thought and care into getting this right.

I've also had the opportunity to do research with Dr. Brown-Xu on polymer recycling. It was rewarding, hands-on, and I learned a lot. She gave us about as much rope as you can give an undergrad working with halogenated solvents and delicate six-figure instruments.

Is there anything else you'd like to share?

This course work has been more "intellectually satisfying" than I expected. For example, physics turned out to be mind-opening (if you can bear to bomb some tests). You finally understand why you've been taking all the trig and calc classes. You see all these pieces of knowledge that formally seemed disjointed and random start clicking together. Very cool.

Studying chemistry has also given me a less superficial understanding of what "science" is, in general (I'm using the Francis Bacon definition here). For example, the last time I thought about a hypothesis was in the 6th grade science fair. But if we take science as a "record of things we know" (about the physical nature of the universe), I now understand why a hypothesis is, ultimately, central to the process. Science is the gold-standard of human knowledge about the physical nature of universe because the currency of science is proof.

FACULTY HIGHLIGHT



Tim Barnett | English

Why did you choose English?

I study language, writing especially, because I think it is the most powerful force in the world. I love to see people expand their voices and to look at language and themselves in new ways. NEIU has been a great place for this kind of work because of its diversity and the unique voices our students bring to the world. I have learned more than I ever expected from them and from the great faculty and staff at our university.

What do you like about NEIU?

I've been extremely lucky to be in a tenured position at NEIU. Tenure provides a lot of freedom to think and to explore the relationships between ideas and actions; it's given me the opportunity to try—and both succeed and fail at—many different sorts of projects and initiatives over my 27 years as a professor. It is one of the things all academics should have to guarantee academic independence.

What part of your work are you most proud of?

Three of the things I am most proud of are working with the Prison+Neighborhood Arts/Education Project and Erica Meiners to bring a college degree program to Stateville Prison, helping to lead our faculty/staff union, and working in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies. Those experiences have reinforced for me the idea that education needs to be responsive to politics and social inequities. They have helped me think of schools as places for individual growth (however individual students might define that term) and as places to imagine and initiate social change, even as we also help students find the careers they need to make it in the world as it exists today. We know, though, that we don't have to settle for the world as it is, and that keeps our work exciting.

What is your educational background?

I received my Bachelor of Arts in English with Honors at Northeastern Illinois University in May of 2020 and my Masters of Science in Higher Administration and Policy from Northwestern University in August of 2021.

What are you doing now?

I am the Assistant Director of the Chicago Field Studies (CFS) Program, which is within the Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences at Northwestern University. The CFS Program is an academic internship program where undergraduate students intern with various companies or organizations for up to 25+ hours a week. While students engage in their internships and contribute to project goals, they also attend a CFS course in the evening that aligns with their interests. In the CFS course students reflect on, discuss, and debate workplace issues that count toward their degree requirements. The CFS program helps students advance both academically and professionally!

In my role, I provide internship and career advising support to students in the CFS program which includes assisting them with interview preparation, resume development, job searches and much more! I also work on maintaining professional relationships with our employer partners and work on developing new partnerships. I offer valuable insights and strategies to both students and employers, ensuring the program's continued success.

What are your best memories from NEIU?

One of my favorite memories from NEIU is participating in the University Honors Program (UHP). This experience was invaluable as it helped me discover qualities and strengths I didn't know I had. The UHP provided a supportive yet challenging academic environment that encouraged my learning and growth.

Through the program, I grew intellectually, gained practical experience, worked on a thesis, developed professional relationships with faculty members, presented at conferences, published my research, and much more. I had the opportunity to work on an honors thesis titled "First-Year Students in Summer Bridge: Improving Academic and Mathematical Success" alongside Dr. Francisco X. Gaytan, t Associate Provost for Student Success and Retention. I also presented my research during a 45-minute session at the 39th Annual Conference on The First-Year Experience in Washington, D.C.

Completing a thesis and presenting at a major conference not only helped me gain admission to my graduate program at Northwestern University but also impressed potential employers during my job search. The UHP is a fantastic program at NEIU, and I highly recommend that students apply!

Do you have any advice for current students?

My best advice for current students is to understand that many career paths are not linear. Your experiences and involvement will help you discover your passions and interests, guiding you toward your long-term career. Everyone's journey is unique in its own way, so try to make the most out of your various experiences.

Take advantage of the numerous resources available at NEIU; participate in internships, gain work experience, join the University Honors Program, present your work at conferences, and meet with your professors during office hours to build mentoring relationships. The more you get involved, gain experiences, and develop professional relationships, the better you will be at finding and achieving your dream career path.


Is there anything else you'd like to share?

"The research that I conducted over the summer introduced me to new concepts and solidified my passion for research. It was great to work with Dr. Brown-Xu and Kevin Kelly to complete our projects, and it was also a great experience to be able to visit Argonne National Laboratory to run some of our tests. The work that I did felt very fulfilling as I was contributing to something important to me, which is finding a solution to plastic pollution.

Conducting research over the summer gave me valuable experience in working in a lab and reading scientific literature. It also allowed me to present my research at the SCSE symposium and the SACNAS Conference. These opportunities will be greatly valuable as I can learn about other research and improve my public speaking and science communication skills."

THE 82: Student Edition









Apply for the SUMMER MERIT SCHOLARSHIP

Applications are due February 1st, 2025

The College of Arts and Sciences provides a limited number of Merit Tuition Scholarships for interested and deserving undergraduates (Second Bachelor's candidates are not eligible) within the College of Arts and Sciences. These scholarships are generally granted for three to six credit hours and students *must* be enrolled at least half-time. Scholarships will be granted on the basis of the student's intended major, status, intended Career/Educational Goals, transcripts and/or ACT/SAT scores, and letter of recommendation.

To be considered for selection, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Transfer and NEIU continuing students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25.
- Students who have earned 45 credit hours at NEIU must be declared majors in the College of Arts and Sciences. Transfer students with over 45 total hours must declare their major in the College of Arts and Sciences by their second semester at NEIU.
- Entering Freshmen must be in the top 15% of their graduating class or have a minimum ACT score of 24 or SAT of 1110.

Applicants must submit a complete application including:

• The name and email address of a faculty member who has agreed to complete a faculty recommendation form.

This award may be withdrawn in instances of substantiated academic misconduct or other violations of University standards pertaining to proper student conduct.

Application Deadlines:

• Fall: May 15

• Spring: October 1

• Summer: February 1

The College Merit Tuition Scholarship Committee will review all applications and notify applicants approximately one month after the application deadline. Incomplete applications will not be considered.

Awards to prospective and declared majors in the College of Arts and Sciences are highly competitive with the College intent on awarding to the most deserving students.
