COVID-19 has upended the academic world. With colleges and universities forced to turn to online learning, students not only miss out on graduation ceremonies and dormitory life. They lose the opportunity for daily personal and collaborative learning.

The [CARES Act](#) has put student loan payments on hold through September 2020 in effort to reduce financial hardship. Additionally, many cell phone providers are giving additional data at no charge, and utility companies are suspending disconnections and providing bill payment arrangement options. Contact the companies that you pay monthly to see what they're offering to their customers during the virus crisis.

NDP Students Put It All Together

The latest addition to classes developed specifically for Interdisciplinary Studies and University Without Walls majors is *NDP 301 Putting it All Together*. The course, first offered in the Fall 2019, is the brainchild of NDP instructor Sean Carey who proposed, developed, and teaches the class. As a graduate of Interdisciplinary Studies who also served a graduate assistantship in NDP, Sean knows the strengths, challenges and opportunities that returning adult students bring to their pursuit of the college degree. Below, Sean, who also teaches *WIP NDP 310 Diversity in the Workplace*, shares his insights about the course.

"I specifically wanted to come up with a class that works on multiple levels. It can work as a reintroduction to higher education expectations and cover some core academic skills such as writing, organization, and research. But, it can also work for students that are more comfortable with those skills, because there is a lot of room to expand on them and to focus on their own personal research and goals." The course content has stayed pretty consistent, but is evolving to meet the students needs. Next semester the plan will be on incorporating more collaborative learning and peer mentoring to engage the class and allow room for students to take on leadership roles. The course focuses on a research project designed and directed by each student on a current academic, personal, or career goal. For example, one student focused on graduating with their BAIS quickly and efficiently, another student researched different options, opportunities, and requirements for graduate school, and another student researched employment pros and cons in a possible career change. Students will learn or solidify basic critical reading, organization, research, writing, and presentation skills. They will also learn how to plan, direct, and execute their own personal project. The ability to be self-guided and independent is a skill that is becoming increasingly in demand in higher education and the workforce today."

Meet Professor Alicia Ozier

We are excited to welcome NDP alumna and now NDP Instructor Alicia Ozier to the NDP faculty. Ms. Ozier teaches the Writing Intensive Program course *NDP 310 Diversity In the Workplace*. She is a graduate of Interdisciplinary Studies and completed a minor in Inner City Studies. As an undergraduate she was the recipient of the Lincoln Laureate Award. After completing her bachelor's degree she received an MA in Social Work (International Administration) from the University of Chicago School of Social Work Administration. Along with her role as NDP Instructor, Ms. Ozier currently works as the Deputy Director of Clinical Practice for the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services. In this role she guides clinical and behavioral health services for children and families within the State of Illinois. Ms. Ozier has maintained a primary focus on understanding the life experiences and developing feasible solutions for underserved women, children, and LGBT adolescents who are isolated by systemic inequality. Ozier maintains a commitment to creating avenues that develop social equity for voiceless individuals within the global space.
