Last January, I finally graduated from my Ph.D. program in Higher Education. I dedicated mv dissertation to my family and to all McNair Scholars who had inspired me to start this endeavor, and whose example helped me to finish it. When I applied to the Ph.D. program, I had been working for McNair for four years. I saw the Scholars work-

king hard to meet their course requirements, complete their research projects, and apply to graduate school, and I admired them. I admired their determination, their diligence, and their hope. I admired their courage to reach for their academic dreams regardless of all the fears that accompanied an unknown future.

During my program, I found out that many of my classmates have been associated with McNair Programs. Dr. Julie Posselt, a prominent equity writer in my field, had been the coordinator of a McNair Scholar Program before she began her Ph.D. program. Her dissertation was about graduate admission decision processes at selective universities. Another of my classmates, Dr. Allyson Flaster, had been an advisor in a McNair Program, and her research focuses upon financial support that affects low-income students' decisions to attend college. Going to research conferences, I hear many similar stories: former McNair staff attending Ph.D. programs specifically in higher education to keep advancing the cause of educational equity. I believe that working with the Scholars not only influences staff to continue their studies but also shapes our intellectual and professional goals. In this way, the McNair Program transforms the lives beyond just program participants—it positively changes the lives of its staff members.

Working full time and being a mom of two kids made the dissertation process difficult. However, mentoring new Scholars and learning about the achievements of former participants renewed the inspiration I had in the first place. I also enjoyed a strong sense of likeminded community that influenced me to finish the doctoral program, not to mention support from former McNair participants.

I'm very thankful for the McNair Program because its influence was so powerful that now I can call myself **Dr. Vidal-Rodriguez.**

TRIO News

Trump Administration Slashes Funding and Proposes Consolidation of TRIO and GEAR UP in FY2020 Budget

On March , 2019, the White House released the President's Fiscal Year 2020 budget request to Congress. This budget request reflects the Administration's spending priorities for the 2020-2021 program year. This proposal includes a historic level of proposed funding cuts — \$2.7 trillion — largely aimed at "non-defense discretionary" programs such as housing, public health, low-income assistance. The U.S. Department of Education is reducing funding by \$8.5 billion (or 12%). It also revives last year's proposal to consolidate TRIO and GEAR UP into a single, state-issued block-grant program at an overall funding level that is approximately one -third below the combined funding levels of both programs.

In addition to this proposal regarding TRIO and GEAR UP, the budget request also included a plan to consolidate six programs supporting infrastructure and academic support at Minority-Serving Institutions, to allow the Pell Grant to be used for "high-quality, short-term" academic programs, and to eliminate funding for 29 other Departmental programs, including Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG), Public Service Loan Forgiveness, and 21st Century Learning Centers.

The Congress will determine the fates of each of these programs. Therefore, it is critical that the TRIO community continue to advocate so that we may preserve the integrity of the TRIO and GEAR UP programs as well as boost their funding in the coming year.
