Self-injury: Healing Through Art

Research showed Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) skills to be beneficial in the treatment of self-injurious behaviors while another study showed art therapy to be beneficial in the treatment of mental illness. Ebaa Wahdan developed a DBT based group using expressive arts for students who self-injure to address these behaviors, and allow them to learn alternative skills. This presentation will explain the goals and objectives of the DBT group, while allowing participants to engage in one of the art activities.
